When peace was finally restored, [California Governor Pat Brown created a commission to study the riots](#); the [McCone Commission’s report](#) ultimately stated that the riots had been caused by deep and engrained social problems: poverty, inequality, racial discrimination, and the passage of Proposition 14 [which nullified the [state’s 1963 fair housing law](#), amending the state constitution to allow individuals to decline to sell, lease, or rent property pursuant to their preferences.]
