

DR. JALIL MUSTAFFA BISHOP

Activist / Researcher / Co-founder of Equity Research Cooperative

Dr. Jalil Mustaffa Bishop is an activist and researcher focused on expanding the public good through racial justice movements. He co-founded Equity Research Cooperative, a collective of advocates working to be the research arm of movement building through redistribution, data, and solidarity. He has published dozens of op-eds, journal articles, and book chapters on the Black Student Debt Crisis, grassroots policymaking, and anti-Blackness.



ANTHEA BUTLER

Author and Professor in American Social thought

Anthea Butler is the Geraldine R. Segal Professor in American Social thought at the University of Pennsylvania. A historian of African American and American religion, Professor Butler's research and writing spans African American religion and American Religious history, race, politics, Evangelicalism, media, and popular culture. Butler's recent book is White Evangelical Racism: The Politics of Morality in America on Ferris and Ferris/UNC Press. Professor Butler was a contributor to The 1619 Book: A New Beginning, with a chapter entitled "Church". Her first book is Women in the Church of God in Christ: Making A Sanctified World, also published by UNC Press.



DR. EDDIE COLE

Professor of Education and History

Eddie R. Cole is Professor of Education and History at the University of California, Los Angeles. His research focuses on college presidents' historic role in shaping racial policies and practices both inside and outside of the educational sphere. His book <u>The Campus Color Line: College Presidents and the Struggle for Black Freedom</u> was described by New York Times-bestselling author Ibram X. Kendi as "a stunning and ambitious origins story... embedded with breath-taking narratives recovered from meticulous research." In 2023, he was named a Harvard Radcliffe Institute Fellow for 2023–24 and spent the year researching his forthcoming book, <u>Black Ideas</u>, a history of American higher education as told through the Black intellectuals who shaped it.

In 2020, She co-founded the theater advocacy organization Professional Non-Profit Theater Coalition (PNTC) – a national advocacy coalition which organized non-profit theaters to advocate for access to the \$15B Shuttered Venue Operators Grant of historically unprecedented funding from the federal government. A 2022 United States Artist Award fellow, Nataki Garrett has received numerous awards and recognition for her artistry and leadership throughout her career. Her vision is to empower artists as leaders and change makers who transform culture.

She is/they are the author of several books, most recently Survival is a Promise: The Eternal Life of Audre Lorde and the award-winning Undrowned: Black Feminist Lessons from Marine Mammals. She is/they are the co-founder of the Mobile Homecoming Trust, an intergenerational experiential living library of Black LBGTQ brilliance.



IAN HANEY LÓPEZ

Chief Justice Earl Warren Professor of Public Law

Ian Haney López lectures and writes about the democracy-destroying power of racism in American politics, and what we can do to build an egalitarian multiracial democracy. He is the Chief Justice Earl Warren Professor of Public Law and Distinguished Professor, Emeritus, at the University of California, Berkeley, and is widely published, including in the New York Times, the Washington Post, and in law reviews at Harvard, Yale, and Stanford. Ian's research on racial politics features in his books Dog Whistle Politics (2014) as well as Merge Left: Fusing Race and Class, Winning Elections, and Saving America (2019), and also in his free online course, Race-Class-Academy.com.

MARIA HINOJOSA Mexican-American Journalist

As a reporter who was the first Latina in many newsrooms, Maria Hinojosa dreamt of a space where she could create independent, multimedia journalism that explores and gives a critical voice to the diverse American experience. She made that dream a reality in 2010 when she created Futuro Media, an independent, nonprofit newsroom based in Harlem, NYC with the mission to create multimedia content from a POC perspective. Futuro does this in the service of empowering people to navigate the complexities of an increasingly diverse and connected world. Hinojosa's Pulitzer Prize-winning podcast, "Suave", focuses on her relationship with David Luis "Suave" Gonzalez, in addition to telling the story of thousands of other people sentenced to die in prison for a crime they committed as a minor. "Suave" is gut-wrenching, deeply personal and full of heart.



JONATHAN METZEL

Author, Psychiatrist, and Professor

Jonathan Metzl is an acclaimed physician and sociologist who speaks, teaches, and writes on a range of topics including mental illness and gun violence, race and whiteness in America, health and healthcare, and diversity and structural competency in higher education. Jonathan Metzl is the author of the groundbreaking book, Dying of Whiteness: How the Politics of Racial Resentment is Killing America's Heartland. Winner of the 2020 Robert F. Kennedy Human Rights Book Award, the book is an in-depth look at why many working-class white Americans support politicians whose policies are literally killing them.

Being a gun violence expert, professor, and psychiatrist is a unique combination that allows Dr. Metzl to speak and write about gun violence in America, and in particular to address stereotypes that link guns with race or mental illness, or that blame mental illness for mass shootings and other gun crimes.

Ijeoma Oluo (ee-joh-mah oh-loo-oh) is a Seattle-based Writer, Speaker and Internet Yeller. Her work on social issues such as race and gender has been published in The Guardian, Esquire, Washington Post, ELLE Magazine, New York Times, NBC News and more. She has been featured on The Daily Show, All Things Considered, BBC News, and more. Her #1 NYT bestselling first book, So You Want To Talk About Race, was released January 2018 with Seal Press. Her second book, MEDIOCRE: The Dangerous Legacy of White Male America, was published December 2020 with Seal Press and her newest book, Be A Revolution: How Everyday People Are Fighting Oppression and Changing the World - and How You Can Too, was released January 2024 with Harper One. LINDA SARSOUR

Author and American Political Activist

Sarsour is the co-founder and executive director of MPOWER Change, the first Muslim online organizing platform. And she served for nearly 16 years as executive director of the Arab American Association of New York. Through these organizations, she has been at the forefront of major civil rights campaigns, including the call for an end to unwarranted surveillance of New York's Muslim communities. In the wake of the 2014 police shooting of 18-year-old Michael Brown, she co-founded Muslims for Ferguson to build solidarity among American Muslims and to work against police brutality. Sarsour co-chaired the 2015 March2Justice—a 250-mile journey on foot, from New York City to Washington, D.C., to deliver a "justice package" to end racial profiling, demilitarize police, and demand the government invest in young people and communities.



DR. MELINA ABDULLAH
Professor / Conference Speaker

Melina Abdullah is Professor of Pan-African Studies at Cal State LA's College of Ethnic Studies, Co-Founder of Black Lives Matter - Los Ángeles and Black Lives Matter Grassroots, where she is also Director. She is a leader in the California Faculty Association (the faculty union), both locally and statewide, and mama of three. Dr. Abdullah earned her Ph.D. from University of Southern California in Political Science and her B.A. from Howard University in African American Studies. Abdullah has authored numerous articles and book chapters. Known by the moniker, Doc Melly Mel, she is creator, host, and producer of the radio programs Move the Crowd on KPFK 90.7 FM and This Is Not a Drill! on KBLA Talk 1580, and is a recognized expert on race, gender, class, and social movements.

Director/Senior scholar of Arab and Muslim Ethnicities and Diasporas
Studies Program at SFSU / Conference Speaker

Rabab Abdulhadi, founding Director/Senior scholar of Arab and Muslim Ethnicities and Diasporas Studies Program, SFSU, and past director of Center for Arab American Studies, University of Michigan-Dearborn, is co-founding Editorial Board member of Islamophobia Studies Journal, lead editor of book volumes and author of over 80 articles and book chapters in seven languages.
